The story behind fabrics

hen you see a beautiful piece of fabric, it's unlikely that you will ponder about the dark realities behind the textile trade. A guided tour of a unique exhibition is set to change that. The Bhau Daji Lad Museum is offering guided tours of Social Fabric, an exhibition curated by Grant Watson of the Institute of International Visual Arts, London, and the museum's director Tasneem Mehta. The Indian textile trade that gained steam during the British colonial rule ended up making the Empire an economic giant. Closer home, it also transformed Mumbai from a sleepy marshland into a modern industrial city. The exhibition assesses the impact of a global network on Mumbai's local textile community, and the mill workers' struggle during the trade union movement. While Sudhir Patwardhan's 2001 work, Lower Parel, presents the once-active mill district in the midst of metamorphosis, placing a defunct mill beside a towering high-rise, Alice Creischer's installation of paper, photos, fabric and beads (in picture) explores the exchange of commodities across countries.

In one of the drawings — A panoply of artists, critics and other arts-related people (2008-2012) — you will spot art critic Ranjit Hoskote, photographer Ram Rahman, as well as, artists Bharti Kher, Krishen Khanna, Atul and Anju Dodiya, among others. Other drawings at the show are also based on portraits including those of Hyderabad-basedpoet Hoshung Merchant (in picture) and artist C K Rajan. The exhibition is on view till November 24.
